NUMERACY LEARNING PROGRESSION

Learning basic skills like reading, writing, spelling, adding and subtracting generally happen in a certain order. On the Australian Curriculum website, the National Literacy and Numeracy Learning Progressions show the order that most children develop these skills.

Use the National Literacy and Numeracy Learning Progressions to see where your child might be up to in their development of a particular skill (like learning to tell the time) and see the next typical step of development.

What you may notice about your child Plays "shop" using play money


Counts the money in their money box.

Decides if they have enough money to purchase several different items. Solves the problem of how much a monthly online subscription fee will cost over a year.

How your child learns to use money Identifies situations that involve the use of money.

Counts collections of coins and writes the values as dollars or as cents.

Represents different money values in multiple ways. Calculates the cost of several items and the change required.

Connects money to decimal notation and uses multiplication strategies to solve problems involving money.

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
